# **Executive Board Meetings**

On December 2nd, the Forum's Executive Board met to discuss declining membership and meeting attendance. We have met twice since then to continue the conversation, consider the alternatives and set an action plan.

With my involvement in the Ontario Council of Camera Clubs, I get to see what is going on at the 35 other member clubs. A simplified summary:

- Most clubs have experienced a decline in membership this season.
- Clubs are offering hybrid meetings in various forms.
- · Live meeting attendance has declined.
- Two clubs have ceased operating due to lack of volunteers to run the clubs and lack of operating funds due to low membership.

## **Recruiting New Members**

We have had some concern about the decline in our membership after returning to live meetings. While COVID had an impact, most other clubs, photography or otherwise, are experiencing the same thing for a variety of reasons.

**Conclusion:** The Board has had discussions about attempting to recruit new members but, in the end, we have decided that we will not pursue an active recruitment at this time, but rather keep our eyes and ears open for possible future members. For instance, some O3C clubs have discontinued print competitions, so this might be an opportunity to keep those people involved in printing.

If you come across someone you feel would be a good fit for the Focal Forum, we encourage you to have a conversation with them, invite them to attend a meeting, bring a print and participate in the evaluation.

## Meeting Structure - Live, Online, Hybrid

We all agree that the Forum is all about prints and that meeting live is the right approach for us. There are too many variable to effectively evaluate images online as prints and it doesn't meet the Forum's mandate. When we look at images online, we're looking at pictures.

**Conclusion:** In general, we are comfortable with the small group that has been meeting and we should continue meeting live. Although the Seoul House's smaller room that we've been meeting in isn't as spacious as the banquet room, it's comfortable and it works. If we know how many people will attend ahead of time, we can arrange to use the larger room.

**Conclusion:** In the winter months, if the weather forecast shows nasty weather on a meeting day, we can make a call the day before or Wednesday AM to meet online. We would let the Seoul House know. Having said that, none of us could remember a time when a meeting was cancelled due to weather.

#### **Seals**

We have not been awarding seals, during the low attendance meetings this season. We discussed whether or not we should continue that approach.

**Conclusion:** We agreed that we will not award seals as long as the low attendance continues. If the attendance climbs, we'll go back to seals, since it is specified in the constitution.

#### **Print Evaluation**

Because of the fewer members at the meetings, we have not imposed time limits for the evaluations - we keep talking about a print until we're done. Also, the moderator and the makers have participated, so the evaluation period has become more of a comfortable conversation about the prints. It's very enjoyable.

**Conclusion:** We'll continue with this approach; however, if attendance increases, we'll revisit this.

8 members attended the January 10th meeting, with 11 prints, which included an extra from Dass, Allan and Laurence. With Steve Rees moderating and taking part in the untimed 'discussion' and the makers joining in with the others, we enjoyed some very interesting comments and insight into each print.



## Fellowship and Camaraderie

Beyond the realm of technical skill, our group provides a haven for genuine connections. As we share meals and engage in spirited discussions, friendships are made. It is the shared love for photography and the art of printmaking that unites us, infusing our group with an essence that truly sets it apart.

As Print Director, it would be negligent of me if I didn't repeat and remind you of the qualities needed for an image to be granted seals. A Gold Seal should be awarded to a print that demonstrates **exceptional** technical and artistic qualities, while a Silver Seal should be awarded to a print that is considered to display **good** technical and artistic qualities.

A print without either a Gold or Silver Seal is lovingly called, a "No Seal." However, this is by no means a roadblock, but rather an opportunity for growth. If your print doesn't receive a Gold Seal, you have the option to modify it and re-submit it as a "Re-Make" at a future meeting. You should bring the original print for comparison, as it will help us appreciate your artistic journey.

During our meetings, let's aim to provide remarks that foster introspection, encourage critical contemplation, and offer analytical insights that prompt thoughtful reflection. We are not here to merely admire each other's work, but to challenge ourselves to evolve artistically. Constructive critique is a catalyst for growth and, by providing thoughtful insights, we contribute to each other's artistic development.

Let's ensure that we remain true to our mission and avoid becoming a mere mutual admiration group. It's in the environment of constructive critique and thoughtful conversations that our artistry is truly refined. Together, we can continue to push the boundaries of our creativity, learn from one another, and expand our artistic horizons.
